can remember. Being a member of The Vocal Jazz Ensemble as well as a part of our theater productions has by far been the highlight of my high school career.



The end of the school year is fast approaching. Students have participated in many exciting extracurricular activities, athletic contests, and fine arts performances. There are several planned celebrations in each of our buildings during the final weeks of school. We look forward to seeing you as we celebrate and honor our students.

Our graduation rate remains one of the highest in the region at 93 percent; marking six years of a graduation rate greater than 90 percent. A new program, Solvay Success Academy, is a new option for students at Solvay High School (SHS). Each year, students entering 9th grade are eligible to apply and work towards a two-year college associate degree while in high school. This new program is in addition to the OCC Advantage Program offered to students; allowing them to obtain a tuition-free associates degree from OCC.

Along with the college program offerings, each building continues to expand enrichment opportunities before and after school for our students. You might remember in 2017, the district was awarded the 21st Century Community

Learning Grant. We now call this grant B.E.S.T. (Building Education Success Together) program. The offerings continue to help students increase academic performance; provide enrichment activities, and support families and their children. Some of the activities include homework help, S.T.E.A.M., recreation activities, art, music, cooking, community service, and field trips. The learning grant runs until 2022.

At the district level, the community support has once again been outstanding. Our district team members designed a budget that continues to be innovative while offering excellent program opportunities for our students. I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for your support for our students and the 2019-20 budget. Educating students is our first priority.

The multi-year capital project approved by voters in 2017 continues. The construction of the new transportation facility has begun, over the summer Solvay Middle School (SMS) will have a new roof as well as many other projects throughout the district will happen during the next few months. These improvements and other projects will deliver an annual savings to the district.

# Solvay UFSD Again Named Among "2019 Best Communities for Music Education"



For the second consecutive year, the Solvay Union Free School District has been named one of the "Best Communities for

Music Education" by the National Association of Music Merchants! A national distinction, the "Best Communities for Music Education" designation is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement in efforts to provide music access and education to all students. Solvay

UFSD is one of only 623 districts to receive this honor in 2019.

Research into music education continues to demonstrate educational,

cognitive, and social skill benefits for children who make music. After two years of music education, research found that participants showed more substantial improvements in how the brain processes speech and reading scores than their less-involved peers. It also found that students who are involved in music are not only more likely to graduate high school, but also to attend college as well.

We'd like to extend our sincere thanks to everyone in the Solvay community who helped make this distinction possible for the second year running. Congratulations!

#### July 9 - Aug. 7


Mondays - Thursdays from 5:30 - 7 p.m. The Able II Driving School will set up times for invehicle instruction following student registration.

#### Solvay Art Students Deliver Portraits to Rohingya Children




Recently, students from Ms. McGraw's art class received news that their portraits were delivered to Rohingya children via the Memory Project!
