Superintendent's Perspective Solvay Superintendent, Jay Tinklepaugh

This September and October marked another very busy, productive, and exciting start to the school year for Solvay. I hope that the start has been a successful one for you, and that you and your family have enjoyed getting back into your school routines. Thank you to all of our students, staff, and families who helped make our opening day a success and helped our students have a smooth transition into their new classrooms. We are always appreciative for the continued support that we receive from our community.

We have several items to celebrate. Each of our schools continue to show growth academically. We had our first student to receive an Associates Degree from Onondaga Community College along with her diploma from Solvay High School. Our students received over \$150,000 in scholarships from the generosity of our school community. Solvay was recognized for the second year as one of the "Best Communities for Music Education." Several students received gold, silver, and honorable mention awards for their artistic talent from the Scholastic Arts Association. Students were recognized for their "extraordinary talent" and "athletes of the week" by our local media. Our athletic teams experienced great success this fall season with football and volleyball going into post season competition.

Thanks to the 21st Century Grant - third year of the "B.E.S.T." program. Over 1,200 of our students participated in before and after school programs. This summer we had students participating in several enrichment programs including some very exciting field trips and activities throughout the county.

Our Early College High School Grant (ECHS) begins its second year with another cohort of students participating. The ECHS grant provides students the opportunity to potentially earn an Associates Degree while they earn their high school diploma. In addition to college/high school concurrent enrollment classes, students also participate in college exploration programming.

We continue to work on plans to strengthen our curriculum and school environment across all grade levels. Additionally, we are working on several initiatives to improve various operations such as striving to go more paperless, electronic report cards, increase electronic parent and community communication, increase use of electronic forms, and provide tutorials for parents, staff, and students.

Our Capital Project is underway and a considerable amount of work was accomplished over the summer. At Solvay Middle School, a new roof was put on along with some interior work including a reconfiguration of the main entrance to the building. The new bus garage is on schedule and is really beginning to take shape. We are looking forward to the completion of the bus garage and the beginning of the next phase of the project, including work at the high school and elementary school buildings.

SHS Students Venture to the Adirondack Region

Students taking SUNY-ESF's general biology class ventured to the North Country on September 27 thru 29, for an Adirondack Ecology experience centered at ESF's Newcomb research campus in Newcomb, NY. The students visited the Atmospheric Science Research Center (ASRC) at Whiteface Mountain, the NYS Mesonet data collection station (one of 126 state-wide), a trip to the summit of Whiteface Mountain to explore the unique ecology of mountain-top plants and the special cloud and acid rain monitoring station,

water sampling from canoes, and explored the cultural history and old iron works of a mining ghost town in Tahawus. They hiked the Goodnow Mountain (elevation 2,690 feet), climbed its Fire Tower and viewed the sweeping 20+ Adirondack high peaks from the summit.



Uganda Administrators Visit SHS

On September 25, SHS hosted two administrators from Ndejje Secondary School in Uganda - Dr. Charles Kahigiriza, Principal, and Mr. David Balaba Ssenkungu, Deputy Principal. During their visit, they had an opportunity to see the integration of technology in teaching, have discussions about technology in the classroom, and learn more about the general day to day activities at SHS. It was a privilege to have colleagues from another country come to Solvay to talk about educational ideas and philosophies.



Registered Dietitians often receive nicknames such as the food police, but I hope to be a living example that these terms are not always accurate when it comes to nutrition. My professional philosophy is shared by many other non-diet dietitians around the globe.

Consider the following thoughts:

- You're not good or bad for eating certain foods.
- You don't need to count calories or build the perfect meal plan each week. Perfect doesn't exist in nutrition, or any areas of life for that matter.
- You're not doing it wrong.
- There is no wrong way to eat. Eating ice cream is not "bad." Skipping the office donuts because you had a filling breakfast and aren't hungry isn't "bad" either. Sometimes there is more on our metaphorical "plate" that requires our immediate attention.

A few questions to ponder...

- Did I restrict myself from eating at all during the past week?
- If so, which food triggered these thoughts?
- Which foods made me feel great this week?
- When I felt hungry, did I eat?
- Are my food choices stressing me out?

Shifting your thoughts to a positive connotation surrounding food can make a huge difference. As many of you know, I am a big advocate for intuitive eating. Use this information as a resource to develop a better relationship with food this holiday season!
